To tie art & restoration together a fundraising event called "Art Beat before the Solar Eclipse" was held in August! Tours of the Historical Vale Hotel and Grand Opera House were given to locals to raise money for the 2018 art season and restoration efforts. The golden sponsor Malheur Federal Credit Union stage was open for Drexel's past talent show super stars. Performing were Jessi Anne, Libby Draper,

Japheth Carlson, Kayla Flint, Teilee Hill, Santana Braniff, Joe Fuson, Brent Foster, The Bruton Sisters and Mc Soul Gypsy J. A Sidewalk Chalk competition was held and the winner Sadie Kulm received a basket full of art supplies donated by sponsor Malheur Drug. Local vendors where present with make-up, jewelry and the Malheur Country Historical Society sharing their knowledge. It was a fulfilled community gathering listening to all the wonderful talent we have locally, learning about the historical buildings and visiting with the vendors.



Drexel H. Foundation receives support from the Oregon Arts Commission, a state agency funded by the State or Oregon and the National endowment for the Arts.

The Oregon Arts Commission granted the Drexel Foundation an Art Builds Community Grant, for their 2nd Public Art Project involving youth leaders. The Drexel Foundation partnered with the Vale High School Art Club, and the Ontario Boxing Club. The Drexel Foundation bought and built 10 benches,. Volunteer youth were involved from the beginning of this project, to empower these youth in solving a need to improve the city streetscape.



Three of the benches were designed by Vale High School Art Club where instructor Kacie Shaffer guided the students painting on the benches. Eddie Melendrez and his Boxing Club designed three benches. Two of the benches were painted during August



Art Camp, and one of the benches was designed at Art in the Park on Flag Day. The final bench was designed by College students. These benches will be placed at their forever spots in the spring once the winter weather is gone. The artists voted on where the benches would be of best use. Another opportunity for the community to vote on where these benches should be placed will be available at the Open House on 12-31-17.



Severe Winter Weather

There was a "Severe Winter Weather Tragedy" that hit our community. Due to enormous amounts of snow during Dec. 2016 and January 2017 many structures began collapsing in our area. In Vale we lost the Odd Fellows building, Aka the "Slipper" which collapsed into a pile of rubble from the heavy snow load.

The Drexel Foundation's 20 year commitment of restoration and upgrades of installing engineered webs to the Opera House roof system, roof repairs, and replace-

ment of a failed beam in the hotel paid off. It gave both these buildings strength during the time the heavy snowfall was taking so many structures in our region. In early life of Vale the Drexel Hotel had the cities water tower on the top of the roof. The hotels roof was stronger than most buildings in Vale. Inside the roofing system is a bridge truss, which supported the weight of the Cities water tower years ago. But the work of removing the snow was urgent and vital. 39,000 cubic feet of snow was removed from the



Hotel and Opera House. Thank you to those who worked so hard at accomplishing this urgent and vital task of snow removal.

Restoration Milestones

During the 2017 year great headway continued in the restoration efforts on the Vale Hotel and Grand Opera House. The Grand Opera House once again proved itself to be a great outside Venue for music and Art events during the Art Beat the Solar Eclipse Event and the Volunteer Appreciation Reception. Music from MFCU stage bounced off the buildings with great acoustic effect and outside seating provided a wonderful summer concert location.

Tremendous headway took place during 2017 with continued Structural Stabilization to the Vale Hotel by brick & mortar repair to the NW exterior rear wing. The West exterior top window archway, and other segments of loose and missing brick were replaced. The entire wall was tuck pointed. The joints mortar

were checked and unsound mortar removed and cut out to appropriate depth; the joints repointed with new mortar to match the existing historical formula of mortar. The wall was cleaned of the organic growth and areas of efflorescence washed off .While the scaffolding was up volunteers also performed window painting and gutter placement at the North & South West roof line.




Open House
